There are many activities being planned for the Summer. While downhill skiing is not among them, I hope each of you finds something else you like to do and can participate in.



Location: Walden Ponds

Direction: From 75th and Valmont go North past Sawmill to Walden Ponds on left; sign is on right. Take the road to parking near covered pavilion and bathrooms where the group will meet.

Location: Sunshine Valley

Please consider your physical capabilities/limitations, the ramble trip details (elevation, surface, topography, etc.) and your schedule in your decision to participate.

10th Mountain Division Hut Trip August 18, 19 and 20, 2024

The Hut Trip is full, but the waitlist is short. There are always people who have to cancel, so please put your name on the waitlist if you have any interest in going. There is no cost to do that. We rented Jay's Cabin at Shrine Mountain on August 18. 19 and 20, 2024, It is located

near Vail Pass, and it is accessible to regular vehicles. This one is uptown! IT HAS POTABLE WATER, FLUSH TOILETS, REFRIGERATOR AND SHOWERS!!! Spend a couple of days unplugged from electronics – no TV or radio. Cell phone service may

not exist either. The bed configuration is different from past events. There are 8 single beds, 1 queen and 1 double. So, we can accommodate 2 couples and 8 singles. When you sign up, specify whether you are single or part of a couple.

The cost is \$225 per person and final payments are due June 15. Volunteers will be solicited to prepare and clean up breakfasts and dinners. You need to bring your own hike lunches. Mattresses and pillows are provided.

Fall Bicycle Ride in Grand County, CO September 3, 4, 5 & 6, 2024

Our agenda will be to arrive on Tuesday the 3rd, some people may choose to have a local ride, and meet at the Fraser house in the evening for a

potluck dinner. Please bring food and lunch supplies for the rest of the days there. There is some local dining in Winter Park and the other local towns. Folks can ride Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday (checkout day).

The Fraser House near Fraser has been reserved for all 3 nights. Please contact Mark Stangl to arrange accommodation if you wish to stay at the Fraser House. Those NOT choosing the Fraser House need to make their own accommodation. There will be a \$25 deposit to stay at the Fraser house. If we get at least 12 people the total fee will be around \$80 for the three nights. The approximate price of the stay there is \$25 per night per person with a contribution to the electrical bill I have approximately \$5.

What we call the Fraser house is the Alpine Learning Center that was built in 1979 by some former members of the club who graciously will rent this thing out to us for a decent price. What I found on my last ski trip there was that it is a great venue for socialization in the evenings and mornings and also for making plans for the following days. This sense of community that I had there with everybody was just wonderful and one of my favorite trips with the ski club so far. Some of you will elect to stay in hotels or in condos owned by other members. I suspect you could be pleasantly surprised at how much fun you will have if you stay with us at the Fraser house. The

house has three bathrooms, one on each level. All sheets and towels are there and are clean. Sleeping bags and bedding are supplied.

The kitchen is more than adequate and there are enough dining and cooking items and supplies for everybody to prepare meals for the day. If anyone would like to prepare a larger group meal, we should start planning for that now and we can add the expense to the overall fee for the trip. Usually, everyone helps clean up in the kitchen. The ride routes have not yet been fully determined. One day, Thursday, will be the Fraser River Bicycle Trail. The other two days will be on county roads in the Grand County vicinity. Efforts will be made for the routes to be hard surfaces, but it is expected that there will be some hard-packed gravel. All efforts will be made to make this an adventure where the strongest to the weakest cyclists may participate. Toward the goal of accommodating those of varying abilities and interests, steep or long climbs will not be sought. The recommended routes will not be available until the end of June since two of the routes must be scouted.

The club is renting various cabins for couples and singles, which will include beds and futons, but this year there are no lofts. Each cabin has a full kitchen. The Ranch has wonderful hot pools available 24/7, so bring your bathing suits! Some include views of Mt. Sopris dusted with snow. The club typically provides vegetarian chili on the first night and salmon the second. The third night is optional potluck. Club members will provide side dishes and desserts. Every evening the club enjoys a happy hour. Bring

your favorite beverage and snacks to share. The cost is \$235 for three nights per person. I will be accepting full payment after August 1st.
